SOMETHING IS GROWING IN THE BACKYARD OF THE CHURCH...COME AND LEARN ABOUT THE NEW RAINBOW COMMUNITY GARDEN!



How and why did the Rainbow Community Garden come into being? What does it have to do with our faith and with being a follower of Jesus? During the summer and fall The Rainbow Community Garden and Adult Formation will be offering monthly conversations to learn and answer questions.

The brief forums will be held on Sundays, following the 10:00 service, in the Great Hall.

* JUNE (June 24th) How did this start? Were there other gardens at St. Mark's? Why are Bhutanese people gardening here? How did other churches get involved?

* JULY (July 22nd) Bhutan101 Christ Welcomed all, We welcome you! Who are our neighbors and friends and how can we make them feel welcomed? Learn a bit about Bhutanese heritage and culture and even learn a few words of Nepali. By the end of this forum you WILL know where Bhutan is located!

* AUGUST (Aug. 19th) *All Saints,* the movie. – Based on a true story, a salesman-turned-pastor Michael Spurlock of a tiny Episcopal church in Smyrna, Tennessee is ordered to shut it down. He attempts to save the church, as well as a group of refugees from Karen State, Myanmar in Southeast Asia. This movie may well have a great parallel message for St. Mark's.

* SEPTEMBER How do we build a community despite all of our differences? Why is Christianity able to help people from all kinds of backgrounds, races, and cultures, come together? Explore ways to begin this valuable and rewarding work.

* OCTOBER Stewardship of God's gifts and food preservation?!? No really, God has provided bountifully, now our job is to use it and preserve it wisely. Come explore how to preserve the bounty from our garden to carry us through the winter (you'll get new recipes too!).

ECUMENICAL SERVICE & RAINBOW COMMUNITY GARDEN DEDICATION-MAY 27

It was standing room only at St. Mark's Sunday, May 27 when the East Longmeadow Methodist, Lutheran, Congregational and Episcopal Churches came together for our annual joint worship service. We also welcomed members of the Nepalese Salvation Church who sang, prayed, and worshiped side by side with us.







State Senator Eric Lesser, who has been a strong supporter and guide of our newly created Rainbow Community Garden, gave the sermon, welcoming our Nepalese sisters and brothers who will be growing food this summer in the garden. He told of his own family's history as immigrants coming from Italy and Russia and stressed how rich our community becomes when we embrace diversity.

During the children's sermon, Fr. Peter talked of God's love for us in providing the food we need. Each child was given a paper cup with soil and seeds to take home and plant.





After the service, the Rainbow Community Garden was formally dedicated by Pastor Enoch of the Salvation Church and Pastor Kelly Turney of United Methodist as the entire community looked on. The clouds could not compete with the light and love that shone upon the garden that Sunday.







MUSICIAN SEARCH UPDATE

At the April Vestry meeting, a team of seven, to serve as the Minister of Music Search Committee, was appointed by the Vestry.

This committee is composed of Adam Lape, Sheila Bennet, Ginny Sill, Ryan Schneider, Tammy Najeebi, Peter Fairman, and Fr. Peter Swarr.

They held their first meeting on May 18 and looked at the results of the Church Music Survey. They began defining what they understand to be the preferences of the church as well as reflecting on the old job description and preparing to write a NEW job description for where St. Mark's finds itself in 2018. This committee hopes to have an updated job description posted this month and will begin creating an interview process in the near future.


St. Mark's Scavenger Hunt & Potluck Cookout

REFRESH THE GREAT HALL PROJECT

Here at St. Mark's Church, as we explore ways to be better stewards by more intentionally using our church facilities, we hope to fully live our mission as a "guiding light and a spiritual home where Jesus' spirit is known" and to provide a necessary income source to continue to pay down our church deficit. This year a group of more than 12 parishioners gathered to pray, dream and plan. The first step of the plan involves "Refreshing the Great Hall" so that it is warm and welcoming to all who enter. The group identified many necessary tasks. (See below & pg 7 for details)



How can you be part of the "Refresh the Great Hall "effort?

- Volunteer to work on any projects? Please see Jen Banker or Ellie Otto
- Church members can participate in the selection of the paint color by voting in the "Pick your Paint Color" survey. Simply place your dollar(s) in the paint can with the color of your choice. The color with the most votes will be the color we paint the lower section of the Great Hall.
- Offer financial support for the projects. Please see the "Support the Refresh the Great Hall Project" area in the Great Hall to see the various ways!!

Proposed Projects

New Lighting

Issue: The lighting is insufficient for many of the events that occur in the Great Hall making it difficult for many individuals to participate.

Resolution: Purchase light fixtures and attach them to the existing ceiling fans. The additional number of lights along with the use of LED light bulbs should greatly enhance the visibility in the hall.

New Paint

Issue: The paint on the walls is dirty and worn from daily use of the hall. The ceiling and walls all need a fresh color and coat of paint.

Resolution: We will purchase paint for the ceiling and walls, one for the upper portion of the walls and a second for the lower portion. Members of the church have offered to do the work which will most likely require the rental of scaffolding or a lift.

Proposed Projects (Cont'd)

New Chair rail

Issue: With the great deal of wear and tear the Great Hall receives the lightly painted lower portion of the wall show the greatest amount of damage. To repaint those portions requires painting the entire wall. **Resolution:** A chair rail will be installed which will allow us to paint the lower wall a darker color. Having a contrasting darker color will mask some of the wear and will allow us to "freshen up" the room periodically by only painting the lower sections of the wall.

Signage

Issue: Walking into our building can be very confusing for newcomers and visitors. Having good signage would make all who enter our church feel welcomed.

Resolution: We plan to purchase new, easy to read, uniform, signage for all entry areas in the church. The signs will be strategically placed throughout the building to provide guidance to the major locations within the building regardless of your entry point.

Sound Absorption

Issue: It is very difficult for people to hear one another speak in the Great Hall due to the height of the walls and the materials used on the floor and ceilings. This is a very frustrating situation and prevents many individuals from participating in events that are held in this room.

Resolution: After a professional reverberation study was performed (at no cost to the church), it has been determined that the best way to address the sound issue in the Great Hall is to install carpeting. Floor carpet tiles are the best option as stained or damaged tiles can easily be replaced. Installation of carpeting may also require the installation of some form of subflooring or leveling agent.

St Mark's Art & Craft Fair is a collaboration in which we bring together talent to showcase (and more importantly sell) their creations. In past years we have had a range of artists and crafters from hand knit sweaters to hand-turned wooden bowls and birdhouses, from homemade jam to ceramics and glassworks, and quite a range in between. The Art & Craft Fair offers a bake sale and lunch items such as homemade soups, chili and loaded baked potato for sale and Raffle of donated items that benefits St. Mark's Church (and helps to keep the cost of the space rental down).

St. Mark's Art & Craft Fair runs from 9 am to 3 pm with set up times Friday 4 p.m. – 8 p.m. and Saturday 7 a.m. – 8:58 a.m. Please arrive prior to 8:30 a.m. Saturday, we lock the doors then to keep early shoppers at bay. The venue, located on a well-traveled road in East Longmeadow, offers two floors of 9+ spacious rooms and ample parking. Artisans MUST be ready for 9:00 am door opening and remain open until doors close at 3:00 pm, no exception.

Advertising includes Newspaper and online ads, lawn signs, local flyers, a Facebook page, as well as participant's own avenues & word of mouth.

St Mark's art & Craft Fair began in 2011 by a small group who have decades of art and craft experience including all aspects of running successful shows, as well as hands on experience in Arts and/or Crafts. We continue to learn and grow each year both from our own experience and from the feedback of participants and shoppers alike and have since doubled in size, while keeping our focus on quality, individuality and our shopper's experience. We are very much looking forward to hosting our 7th annual fair in November. Trying to give Artisans as much say in the use of their own space we are not juried, the only requirement is "handmade" with the occasional (committee approved) exception, such as the church raffle baskets and ever popular plant sale. We do require a description of your goods when applying to avoid an overabundance or competing art/craft and will limit as needed. This also helps when it comes to assigning spaces. We offer 3 different size spaces, if one is not enough you can combine the options to achieve the size space that will suit your needs, if less space is needed, we can accommodate that also. We are happy to speak with you about your specific set up needs.

An application is attached. We look forward to seeing you and your work in November. Please note, incomplete applications will not be considered.
