### PARISH ADMINISTRATOR—RETIRING



As parish administrator, Diane Chandler has been the "gatekeeper" of St. Mark's for the past 15 years. She oversees a wide array of duties, ensuring the "business" of the church runs smoothly. As the person who answers the phone in our office, she is often the first person to greet newcomers.

But after 15 years of service, Diane has decided to retire. "I have loved every minute working here!" she says.

Diane's retirement will become effective next spring, and the Vestry has already made plans to fill Diane's position. A search committee will be formed in January, with plans to advertise the position by February. Interviews are planned for February and March. The vestry hopes to hire a new administrator by the end of April, so that Diane is available to help acclimate the new administrator to the job.

When Diane interviewed for the job in 2004 with Paul Briggs, our rector at the time, she was sure she got the job, "I felt like we just clicked," she says. Since then, she has continued to be an important part of the parish. "The St. Mark's community just took me in, and I have formed personal, close relationships with several members," she said;

She calls Fr. Peter Swarr "a great boss," and praises him for his energy and sense of humor. "He really knows how to introduce change painlessly, move things forward, and is willing to do the work to make it happen," Diane said. "He has been a wonderful mentor to me."

Although she will miss St. Mark's, Diane says retirement will bring some exciting changes. She and her husband, Steve plan on spending more time with three of their grandchildren in Longmeadow. They will become "snowbirds." spending the winter months in Alabama, where her youngest son and family live."it will be fun to spend some extended grandparent time" with her grandchildren down South, she says.

# THANK YOU TO ALL FOR MAKING ART & CRAFT FAIR A TREMENDOUS SUCCESS!

Our 9<sup>th</sup> annual Art & Craft Fair was held on Saturday, November 23<sup>rd</sup>, and we could not have asked for better weather, a better team of volunteers, a better collection of local artisans and, ultimately, a better final result.

We had 44 different artisans filling our Great Hall, sanctuary, library, Founders Room, Williams Media Room and parts of our youth education area, putting their talents on display for hundreds of visitors to purchase. In addition, we had spectacular homemade food prepared by a wonderful team of kitchen volunteers, a raffle with more than 80 items and our 2<sup>nd</sup> annual Cookie Walk featuring more than 4,000 homemade cookies, most of which sold out! What's more, our Thrift Shop remained open throughout the day and did wonderful business all day long.

In the end, thanks to the efforts of more than 50 tireless volunteers who helped put it all together, St. Mark's Church raised a net total of more than \$7,000 from the Art & Craft Fair, a significant increase from our goal of \$5,000. This is great news for the ongoing ministries we support both inside St. Mark's and out in the greater community, and the best part of it all is it was generated in the spirit of cooperation and faithful collaboration in which St. Marks' mission has always been rooted.

### Minutes of the October 22, 2019 Meeting St. Mark's Vestry

Present: Fr. Peter Swarr, Sue Schneider, Rob Fitzpatrick, Claire Sygiel, Peter Fairman, Ellie Otto, Scott Conrad, Nancy LaBrie, Jon Robichaud, Jake Berry, Doreen Tapper, and Rich Bruns.

The meeting was called to order with an opening prayer at 7:00 p.m.

Vestry spent some time reflecting on who is leading the church, laity or clergy and how best to fill the upcoming positions on vestry for 2020. The suggestion was made to ask ministry team leaders for ideas and look to members of the leadership group, the recently received and confirmands...

Jon made a motion, seconded by Peter F, to accept the September minutes as submitted. The motion carried unanimously.

Vestry members reviewed the information sheet about various activities in the parish. Fr. Peter put some numbers to the activities listed, noting that 50-plus people attended the Pet Blessing at A.W. Brown, the food packing event resulted in 16,860 meals being packed by more than 60 people. The Way of Love Pray event had 35 people. The Mexican dinner had about 70 attendees and netted \$982.35.

It was noted that the Sunday service is now being live streamed into the nursery. Peter Rosengarten is training to be assistant treasurer. Sue reported that the Art & Craft Fair preparations are going well and that Jess Lister's email was handled thoughtfully by the fair committee, who recognized the work Jess has put into the fair in years past.

Under Updates, Rob reported the large tree that fell down by the memorial garden will be taken care of on Saturday. Jon noted that the HVAC in the admin wing was taken care of, the permanent railing around the sump pump hole was finished and that the playhouses in the playground did not survive the windstorm. Fall cleanup will be November 16. Scott said the sink in the kitchen has been worked on as well as two of the three coffeemakers.

Fr. Peter reported that the new welcome sign should be arriving on Oct 23 and plans were discussed for unveiling it to the congregation. It was decided that an FAQ sheet would be developed by Sue, Nancy and Doreen to be distributed and an opportunity to talk after the church service about the sign would be made available.

Sue announced that vestry retreat will be held January 31 to February 2 with a departure time on Sunday of 2 p.m. The annual meeting is scheduled for January 19.

The vestry went into executive session.

Under Discussion Items, Fr. Peter informed the vestry that an area business approached him with the desire to sponsor Holy Grounds. After much discussion about the pros and cons, Fr, Peter made a motion, seconded by Ellie, to take the request under advisement to give vestry members a chance to think and pray about it. The motion carried unanimously.

Sue suggested changing the former idea of a Matching Gift initiative to a Keep The Lights On initiative and aim for the entire \$10,000 cost.

Scott updated the vestry on the financial picture, noting that problem with last month's financials has been rectified. Gail will create steps for the counters and a training breakfast for counters is planned. Fr. Peter reported 44 out of 135 estimate of giving cards have been returned with 24 showing an increase, 7 reduced and 13 staying the same. Five of the cards are from new members.

Sue pointed out the ministry team budgets for 2020 and Fr. Peter made a motion, seconded by Nancy, to accept the recommendation of the ministry team budgets. The motion passed unanimously. Sue also showed vestry the fixed costs estimates for 2020.

Under Quick Action Items, Sue noted that the Fire Safety committee streamlined the evacuation process in the case of fire at the church and a training will be held on October 26. The Vestry Person of the Day will be responsible for seeing that the positions are filled every Sunday.

Sue reported that the meeting on Keep The Lights On initiative will be held November 6 at 6 p.m.

Fr. Peter updated the vestry on pastoral concerns.

The meeting was adjourned at 9 p.m.
